# Michelle Harkness MENTORSHIP AWARDS

A celebration of dedication to mentorship & leadership development in the Canadian allergy, asthma & clinical immunology community.

The Michelle Harkness Mentorship Awards (MHMA) were created to honour the memory of Michelle Harkness, AllerGen's Manager of Highly Qualified Personnel (HQP) Training and Events from 2011 to 2017, following her sudden passing in August 2017.

MHMA awards recognize researchers, trainees, and a range of others working in the airway and allergic diseases field who demonstrate a significant commitment to promoting the career enhancement and personal growth of others through mentorship.

Recognition and encouragement of mentorship is a fitting tribute to Michelle because of her deep commitment to nurturing the personal and professional growth of those with whom she worked, especially the AllerGen trainees.

While initially only AllerGen Network members were eligible, since 2021 any Canadian working in a related field is eligible to be nominated for an MHMA award or to apply for an MHMA grant.

The awards have been supported by AllerGen and generous donations from members of the AllerGen community whose lives she touched, and from Michelle's family and friends.

The MHMA awards process has been overseen by a committee of Harkness family members, AllerGen investigators, HQP leaders, previous awardees and AllerGen staff. Former AllerGen Board members and previous recipients of the MHMA lifetime achievement award are enlisted to adjudicate each years' slate of nominees.
